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
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



St. Iosaphat's Church

History of the Parish of St. Josaphat B. & M.

▼N the early '80's there was a noticeable influx of immigration from Poland to this country. Large groups of these Polish people picked for their home the growing and promising city of Chicago. Many of them settled on the near north side in what is known as the Lake View district. The only drawback to their settlement in this section of the city was the absence of a Polish Catholic Church. The nearest one was that of St. Stanislaus on the other side of the river. In those early days there was no street car system to take one to church. It was therefore an inconvenience and, in inclement weather, a great hardship to attend Mass on Sunday. Yet these people would walk on foot in rain and snow, sunshine and cold, to the church of St. Stanislaus, for in their hearts there was a strong and lively faith. Others would attend services at St. Michael's German church which was also quite distant.

THE BEGINNING OF THE PARISH

When enough Polish families to support a church of their own settled here, a committee was sent to the Rev. Vincent Barzynski, C. R., the pastor of St. Stanislaus, requesting him to establish a new parish in their district. The request was readily granted and thus began the parish of St. Josaphat.

About twelve lots were purchased facing both Southport and Ward Street, just north of Belden Avenue. Ground was broken in 1883 for the erection of the combination church and school building. In May, 1884, the church was blessed.



THE FIRST PASTOR

Father Kruszka, in his "History of the Poles in America," says that the first pastor of St. Josaphat's was the Rev. C. Kozłowski. This is not correct for Father Kozłowski himself informs us that the first pastor was the Rev. Felix Zwiardowski, C. R. He came to this parish on the 25th of March, 1884. He remained but a short time for in May, 1884, the Rev. Francis Breitkopf, C. R., was appointed to take his place, and remained until August, 1885. His successor until September, 1889, was the Rev. C. Kozłowski. Both Father Breitkopf and Father Kozłowski resided in the home of Mr. Charles Roeske directly opposite the church property. Father Kozłowski was transferred to Lemont, Ill, and the Rev. Mozejewski came to take his place but remained only one short week.

DEBT OF THE PARISH

No definite information can be obtained regarding the actual cost of the land and of the buildings erected. Father Kozłowski left a notation in the financial record book that the parish owed \$15,000 to a Mr. Chandler of 110 Dearborn Street. Besides that, there was a debt of \$400 borrowed from the Ladies' Rosary Society. He also gives us a list of the members of the Parish Committee: Charles Roeske, Thaddeus Klein, Charles Groja, Lawrence Furman, Frederic Groja, John Dosz, Michael Bober, August Sychowski, Frank Spiczak, Joseph Gut, Joseph Krella, Michael Kunz, and John Rumps.

COMING OF FATHER LANGE

The Rev. Francis Lange succeeded Father Mozejewski on September 14th, 1889. His first assistant was the Rev. Joseph Malecki from 1890-1892. During the summer of 1892, Father Lange was compelled to go to Europe because of his ill-health. In his absence, the parish was looked after by the Rev. Francis Kroll, the pastor of St. Casimir's.

On March 22nd, 1893, the Rev. Adalbert Furman said his First Mass in our church and remained here as assistant until September of that year.

Then he was appointed pastor of St. Casimir's in place of Father Kroll, who resigned.

The Rev. J. Kolesinski was assistant here from December, 1893, until January 15, 1894. On June 7, 1894, the Rev. Stanislaus Łączynski of the diocese of St. Cloud arrived and remained here as curate until May, 1895. The Rev. William Nowakowski was assistant to Father Lange from June, 1895, to July, 1897. Then there was Father Gronkowski, from August, 1897, to May, 1900; Father August Koytek, from July, 1900, to July, 1901; Father Smogór, from October, 1901, to April, 1902; and the Rev. S. Cholewinski came in July, 1902.


A DEPLORABLE INCIDENT

Rev. Francis Lange was pastor of St. Josaphat from September 14th, 1889, until July 23rd, 1914. He came at a very critical period in the history of this parish. For some unknown reason a number of parishioners were staging a disgraceful demonstration in front of the sisters' home. On that very day Father Lange had just arrived to take possession of his parish. Seeing the shouting mob in front of the convent he cried out, "For shame, you

are disgracing the honor of the Polish people." He endeavored to persuade them to leave: "The one, whom you are seeking is not here. Rather turn in your anger upon me." But they answered, "We have no quarrel with you, Father Lange." He replied, "If that is so, then go to your homes immediately. I am your pastor and I beg you to calm yourselves." Most of the people listened to his entreaties and went home. However, a few of the more restless spirits milled around until 10 o'clock that night.

FALSE REPORTS

That was the first and only disturbance in the parish. Later there were times when certain persons tried to destroy the people's confidence in their pastor but fortunately another outbreak did not occur again. About the year 1885 a polish paper "Dziennik Polski i Kropidło" ran a series of evil articles about the parish. As was evident, these articles were the product of the evil minds of certain renegade Catholics. They published lies about the pastor and his parish in order to create a disturbance among the people against their pas-

tor. Fortunately the people did not permit themselves to be led astray by the lies of these evil people but remained loyal to their pastor.

Father Lange enjoyed the full confidence of his people. They loved him sincerely and cooperated with him most faithfully. His one great ambition was to build a church that would do justice to his great parish. Finally his dreams became a reality and the foundation of the church was laid. The iron superstructure was completed and the bricklayers were ready to lay the brick and stone. The supports holding the superstructure were removed and that was the cause of the disaster that followed. Late that afternoon sudden darkness descended upon the city. Dense masses of dust and sand were whirled about with great violence. In great fear people deserted the streets and sought shelter indoors. Everywhere the destruction was enormous. This terrific hurricane enveloped in its mighty arms the iron superstructure of the church and hurled it with a thunderous roar upon the building. So great was the damage done to the school that for some time the parishioners had to

attend Mass at St. Alphonsus about a mile to the north.

DESCRIPTION OF THE CHURCH

This unforseen misfortune did not dishearten the pastor but spurred him on to greater efforts. The result of his endeavors is the present magnificent and beautiful church. The church was blessed June 8th, 1902, by Bishop Muldoon in place of Bishop Feehan who was ill. The sermon was delivered by Bishop P. P. Rhode, then pastor of St. Michael's church in South Chicago. The "Record Herald," a Chicago newspaper, carried a picture of the church and the following account:

"The first Catholic church in the United States to be absolutely fireproof and using the steel skeleton construction is to be thrown open to the public to-day with impressive ceremonies. It is located at Belden and Southport Avenues. The architect was William J. Brinkman, who spent years of study on the details. The interior supports are large angle and plate steel columns sixty-five feet high, which carry the heavy steel


trusses that have a clear space of sixty-six feet. The large plaster panels of the coffered ceiling are applied direct to the metallic lath. Another feature of the church is the stone tracery windows, it being the first in the West with stone mullioned windows, the glass being cemented into the stone. The floor is of Roman ceramic mosaic in beautiful design. Another feature of the church are the three delicately carved doorways and large rose window above the same. hewn out of solid stone and among the most beautiful in the city. Through a vestibule of Italian white marble the auditorium is reached. It seats 1,200 persons. The stations of the cross are in niches in the walls; the confessionals are also in recesses in the masonry, and the radiators are recessed so that the entire floor space is unobstructed. A six foot aisle around the auditorium will be used for processions. At one end of this aisle is the baptistry and at the other an adoration chapel. The gallery will accommodate 300 persons."

NEW SCHOOL

The parish was growing steadily each year and the number of children in our school increased to such an extent that all accommodations for them were exhausted. There was an urgent need of another building for it could not be permitted to expose the children to the loss of their faith by sending them to the public schools. Five lots were purchased on the south-east corner of Belden and Southport Avenues. In 1913 a new school building was erected upon three of these lots. The building is spacious and quite modern. It contains six class rooms and two halls for entertainments. Father Lange must have had a sort of prophetic vision, when he had these two halls included in the plans for the new school. He must have fully realized that, if the young people are to be kept in close touch with their own parish, facilities must be provided for their various activities and entertainments. The two halls provided these facilities especially in the last two years.

DEATH OF FATHER LANGE

Soon after the building of the new school a great misfortune befell the parish. On July 23rd, 1914, the beloved pastor, Father Lange, died suddenly in the Alexian Brothers Hospital. His death caused universal sorrow in the parish for he had endeared himself very much to all the parishioners. His portrait is to be found in practically every home. His name is even now, twenty years after his death, held in the greatest respect and love.

MSGR. OSTROWSKI ARRIVES

Monsignor F. G. Ostrowski, the present pastor, arrived at St. Josaphat September 10th, 1914. Because of the splendid order and discipline introduced by his zealous predecessor, he did not encounter any great difficulties. His chief undertaking was the building of a new rectory. The old one was too small to accommodate four priests, and the help had their quarters in the damp and unhealthy basement. Having obtained permission from Cardinal Mundelein, he built the present fine rectory.

During his tenure of office as pastor, four bowling alleys were opened to the public in the old school. A club for the young people of the parish was organized. The upper hall in the new school has been transformed into an excellent gymnasium used by some 200 young people chiefly for playing the game of basketball.

SCHOOL

The founders of the parish fully realized the need of a parish school in order to preserve in the hearts of their children, the highest religious and national ideals. At the very beginning of the existence of the parish, they asked for some Reverend Sisters to educate the children. In the year 1884, four sisters arrived: two of them German, one American, and one Polish. These sisters remained but one year for Father Barzynski believed the needs of the parish children would best be served by strictly Polish Sisters. So in 1885, he invited the Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth, who, but a short time before, were founded in Poland by that pious servant of God, Frances Siedliska. Upon being approached to provide sisters for the distant church in America, she asked to have some time to consider the proposal, for she did not wish to make any grave mistake. She asked the advice of her ecclesiastical superior, first, the Cardinal

Vicar, Parocchi, then, the Cardinal Prefect of the Propoganda, and finally, Cardinal Ledochowski. All praised the proposal and urged her to accept as soon as possible. Being convinced that God wished her to do this work in America, she chose and prepared the nuns she was to take along with her. On June 13th, they visited the Holy Father, Leo XIII, who received them most graciously and bestowed upon them His Apostolic blessing and his sincere prayer that their work might always be guided by the Holy Ghost. They departed from Rome June 17, 1885, and arrived in New York on the 4th of July. Then they came on to Chicago and were met at the station by Father Barzynski and Father Radziejewski. They accompanied them to their place of residence on Belden Ave., the combination church and school of St. Josaphat. The first thing they did upon entering the building was to go to the church on the second floor and thank God for their safe journey. The church was really a big hall in which were placed three wooden altars and a few pews. The tabernacle was of wood. Stark poverty could be noticed everywhere.

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They then met the pastor, Father Breitkopf. The ladies of the parish came to see them and brought food for the sisters. They cried for joy upon seeing their own country women. The home of the sisters was almost bare, with the exception of a

few beds and tables. They found here ten orphans. The oldest boy, about ten years old, was very sick; the oldest girl was but one year old. The Reverend Mother, Frances Siedliska, at once took these poor orphans under her care. During the ensuing days they became gradually acquainted with the parishioners and won the affection and love of everyone, by their goodness of heart. Every day, women, boys and girls came to visit the sisters. For all the Reverend Mother had a medal, a holy picture, some sound spiritual advice.

God wished to test the love and courage of these sisters. Barely a month passed and His Hand touched their community, one of the sisters died.

In the month of September they made a retreat in preparation for their work in school, which opened up September 9th. Thus they took care of both the orphanage and the school. In the beginning there were twenty boys and girls. The first superior of the school at St. Josaphat's was Sister M. Loretta, who is at present the Mother General of the Sisters of Nazareth.

The Reverend Sisters of Nazareth have been teaching in St. Josaphat's School from its founding until this day. May God grant that they always remain with us and may God always confer His choicest blessing upon them for their wonderful work with the children of our parish.

Announcements for June

The Feast of Corpus Christi falls on Thursday, May 31st. It is not a holy day of obligation. During the Octave, the Blessed Sacrament will be exposed every day during the Mass. Immediately after the Mass there will be Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. In the evening during the Octave, Vespers will be said and there also will be a procession with the Blessed Sacrament. On Sunday the procession will take place immediately after the 10:30 o'clock Mass.

Every normal boy has a great passion to take part in some kind of play whether baseball, football, basketball or some other form of athletics. He has the physical strength and the nervous





He will try to bring into the play all the qualities of his mind and body in order to come out ahead of the other fellow. 

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Historja Parafji św. Józafata, B. i M.

PIĘCDZIESIĄT lat temu Polacy zamieszkujący dzielnicę Lake View mieli spory kawał drogi do kościoła, albowiem musieli iść pieszo aż na Stanisławowo, gdyż w owych czasach tramwaje jeszcze nie kursowały w tej okolicy. Chodzić pieszo, a to często w niepogodzie, w czasie ostrych mrozów, nie było im przyjemnem, przeto niektórzy z nich uczęszczali do niemieckiego kościoła św. Michała, bo było im bliżej.

Coraz to więcej Polaków osiedlało się w tej dzielnicy i wtedy, gdy czuli się na siłach utrzymać własną parafję, poprosili Ks. Wincentego Barzyńskiego, C. R., ówczesnego proboszcza parafji św. Stanisława Kostki, o założenie parafji w ich dzielnicy. Ks. W. Barzyński widząc, że jest ich wystarczająca liczba, skłonił się do ich prośby i za pozwoleniem wyższej władzy zapoczątkował parafję św. Józafata, B. M.

Ks. Wacław Kruszka w swojem dziele "Historja Polska w Ameryce" ma to do powiedzenia o początku parafji św. Józafata:

"Piątą co do starszeństwa parafją w Chicago jest przegrodzona rzeką i kolejami od św. Stanisława, parafją św. Józafata, założona w roku 1884, o milę i ćwierć, w prostej linji, na północ od Stanisławowa, a trzy i pół mili na zachodnią-północ od środka miasta. Pierwszym proboszczem był tu Ks. Kandyd Kozłowski."

Wszakże Ks. Kruszka nie był dokładnie poinformowany w sprawie pierwszego proboszcza, bo nie był nim prawdziwie Ks. K. Kozłowski, ale Ks. Feliks Zwiardowski, C. R., którą to informację mamy od samego Ks. Kozłowskiego, który następującą notatkę umieścił na pierwszej stronicy książki finansowej:

"Grunta pod kościół kupione w roku 1882. Budowa szkoły i tymczasowego kościoła rozpoczęta w r. 1883, a w r. 1884, w miesiącu maju, kościół poświęcony. Pierwszy proboszcz Ks. Feliks Zwiardowski. Drugi proboszcz Ks. Franciszek Breitkopf. Trzeci proboszcz Ks. Kandyd Kożłowski. Dwanaście lotów pod kościół i szkołę i plebanję. Rozmiar lotów: od strony południowej, od Southport aż do Ward, 256 stóp. Od strony wschodniej: 144 stóp Ward ulica: od strony północnej od Belden i Ward do Southport 256 stóp. Od strony zachodniej Southport 128 stóp.

Szkoła, długa 120 stóp a szeroka 63 stóp. Plebanja długa 53 stopy, a szeroka 29 stóp. Grunta pod kościół 185 stóp długości a sze-

rokości 95 stóp."

Pierwszym więc proboszczem był Ks. Feliks

Zwiardowski, C. R. Przeniósł się tutaj 25 marca, 1884, i pozostał do Uroczystości Bożego Ciała tegoż roku.

Po nim nastąpił w maju, 1884, Ks. Franciszek Breitkopf, także Zmartwychwstaniec, i pozostał tutaj aż do sierpnia, 1885. Mieszkał on u Państwa Karolostwa Roesków zaraz naprzeciw gruntów kościelnych. W tym domu także aż do wykończenia plebanji przebywał Ks. Kandyd Kozłowski, jego następca. Przybył on na Józafatowo w sierpniu, 1885, i pracował aż do września, 1889.

Po nim urzędował bardzo krótko, bo tylko jeden tydzień, Ks. Możejewski, z Lemont, III., na którego miejsce przeniesiono Ks. Kandyda Kozłowskiego.

Ile zaplacono za grunt, ile kosztowało pobudowanie szkoły i tymczasowego kościoła, nie mamy pojęcia, bo te fakta nie są podane w księdze rachunkowej.

Gdy Ks. Kozłowski przeniesiony został do Lemontu, zostawił następującą notatkę w księdze finansowej:

"Kościół św. Józafata ma długu w banku u Chandlera \$15,000.00, wyraźnie piętnaście tysięcy. Pożyczka zaciągniona 1-go maja, 1889 roku. Termina wypłaty procentu dnia 1-go maja i dnia 1-go listopada. Premium od pożyczki już zapłacone. Pożyczka na procent pięć i pół od sta.

Na bieżące półrocze zapłacone jest już procentu czterdzieści pięć dolarów.

Chandler mieszka na 110 Dearborn.

Parafja św. Józafata oprócz powyższego długu pożyczyła jeszcze z kasy Bractwa Niewiast Różańca św. czterysta dolarów (\$400) bez procentu. Innego długu prywatnego parafja św. Józafata nie posiada.

Robotnikom, którzy dach na kościele i plebanji pokrywali, Schnajderowi należy się \$70.00, drugiemu należy się \$60.00, obowiązani są dać na piśmie gwarancję.

Potem Ks. Kozłowski podaje listę Komitetu Parafjalnego:

Komitet Parafjalny składa się z następujących osób: Karol Roeske, Tadeusz Kleina, Karol Groja, Wawrzyniec Furman, Fryderyk Groja, Jan Dosz, Michał Bober, August Sychowski, Franciszek Spiczak, Józef Gut, Józef Krella, Michał Kunz, Jan Rumpca."

Ks. Franciszek Lange, następca Ks. Możejewskiego, umieścił w książce finansowej notatkę, którą teraz podaje:

"Po Wiel. Ks. Kozłowskim nastąpił Ks. Możejewski, który pracował przy parafji św. Józafata tylko od 7-go września, 1889, do 14-go września, 1889. Po Ks. Możejewskiem nastąpił 14go września, 1889, Ks. Franciszek Lange. Ks. Józef Malecki nastał tu jako pomocnik (wikaryusz) w maju, 1890, i był tu aż do 7-go października, 1892, bo go Ks. Arcybiskup usunął. Od 10-ga maja aż do 22-go września, 1892, byłem na wakacjach w Europie ze względu na poratowanie zdrowia, przez który czas (mnie) Ks. F. Kroll, wtenczas jeszcze proboszczem św. Kazimierza w Chicago, mnie zastępował.

Dnia 22-go marca, 1893, Ks. Wojciech Furman odprawił pierwszą Mszę św. w naszym kościele i był tu asystentem od tego czasu aż do września tegoż roku, kiedy go Ks. Arcybiskup na proboszcza u św. Kazimierza przeznaczył, skąd Ks. Fr. Kroll sam się usunał. Potem byłem sam.

Przez grudzień, 1893, do 15-go stycznia, 1894, pomagał mi Ks. J. Kolesinski. Potem znów byłem sam, aż Ks. Stanisław Łączyński z dyecezyi St. Cloud przyszedł, który tu pracował od 7-go czerwca, 1894, do 17-go maja, 1895, odkąd objął parafję w Webster, Mass. Podobno ładna to parafja, ale trochę poburzona przez Ks. Plucińskiego. 26-go czerwca, 1895, Ks. Bolesław Nowakowski, święcony dla naszej arcydyecezyi i pracował ze mną do 15-go lipca, 1897.

Ks. Gronkowski od sierpnia, 1897, do maja, 1900.

Ks. Aug. Koytek od lipca, 1900, do lipca, 1901.

Ks. Smogór od października, 1901, do kwietnia, 1902.

Ks. St. Cholewiński od lipca, 1902."

Ks. Fr. Lange więc był proboszczem od 14-go września, 1889, aż do 23-go lipca, 1914. Jego pierwszem zadaniem tutaj było uśmierzyć wzburzone umysły. Przyszedł on w krytycznej chwili, gdy zły duch opanował umysły niektórych parafjan, którzy się rzucili na dom Wiel. Sióstr. Dlaczego, trudno się dowiedzieć. Dość, że w tej chwili wchodzi na grunta parafjalne Ks. Fr. Lange. Widząc motoch przy drzwiach klasztornych, zawołał do nich: "Wstydźcie się, hańbę przynosicie imieniu pol-

Perswadował im, by ustąpili, mówiąc: "Niema tego, którego szukacie, raczej mnie bijcie."

Odpowiedzieli: "Nie mamy nic przeciwko Ks. Langiemu." "Jeżeli tak, to idźcie do domów swoich. Ja jestem teraz waszym proboszczem, więc proszę was, abyście się uspokoili."

Większość rozeszła się do domów swoich, wszakże kilku burzycieli jeszcze pozostało i wytrwało na swojem stanowisku aż do 10-ej wieczorem.

Tento był jedyny burzliwy wyskok parafjan na Józafatowie. Od tego czasu już nie było żadnego zaburzenia, chociaż tu i tam powstawali tacy, którzy starali się siać niezgodę u parafjan i osłabić ich zaufanie do proboszcza. Na dowód tego mamy notatkę umieszczoną przez Ks. Langiego w sprawozdaniu parafjalnem z roku 1895. Pisze on:

"Różne złośliwe uwagi, któremi się odznaczały "Dziennik Polski i Kropidło" o naszej parafji, były niczem innem jak wynalazkiem bezbożnych i od wiary odpadłych ludzi.

Wynajdywanie kłamstw przeciw Proboszczowi i jego spokojnej parafji ma jedynie to na celu, ażeby najprzód wywołać zamieszanie w parafji, potem zniechęcić ludzi do Księdza a wreszcie, ażeby liczbę niedowiarków, do których ci ludzie należą, którzy o nas oszczercze artykuły pisali, powiększyć. Są to rodzeni bracia Antychrysta z tą tylko różnicą, że tamten podobno z rozpalonym żelaznym piecem przy końcu świata jeździć będzie; ci już piórem, morowem powietrzem zarażonem, na pokornym papierze złość swoją i nienawiść ku Jezusowi wylewają."

Ks. Lange zaprowadził tutaj wzorowy porządek i pod jego ojcowskiem kierownictwem parafja wzrastała i rozwijała się i stała się jedną z najpiękniejszych w Stanach Zjednoczonych. Parafjanie szanowali swego proboszcza i byli do niego bardzo przywiązani, przeto zawsze zgadzali się z jego wolą i chętnie spełniali jego wszystkie życzenia.

Najgłówniejszem pragnieniem Ks. Langiego było postawić nowy kościół. O tem marzył, nad tem planował, jakby wybudować świątynię, z której parafjanie będą mogli się poszczycić. I też rzeczywiście doczekał się spełnienia swoich marzeń. Ale nim się to stało, parafja doświadczyła nader boles-

nego ciosu. Albowiem krótko po rozpoczęciu budowy kościoła, nawiedziło parafję wielkie nieszczeście.

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Spustoszenie Wyrządzone Przez Huragan.

Żelazna klatka kościola była wykończona i mularze już gotowi byli kłaść cegłę, dlatego usunięto podpory trzymające żelazną klatkę, a to było fatalnem. Albowiem tegoż dnia po południu ciemności nagle okryły miasto, tumany kurzu napełniły powietrze, wszystko zaczęlo gonić do domów swoich: strach wielki ogarnał całe miasto. Spustoszenie ogromne wszędzie było widocznem. Straszny ten huragan uderzył w klatkę żelazną naszego kościoła, a ta nie mając podpór, łatwo przewróconą zostala i całym ciężarem swoim spadła na gmach szkolny i wyrzadziła szkodę ogromną tak, że przez dłuższy czas nie można było budynku tego używać i parafjanie musieli chodzić na nabożeństwa do kościo'a św. Alfonsa o milę na północ.

Ale i to nieszczęście przeminęło i niedługo potem marzenia Ks. Langiego zostały urzeczywistnione, bo powstała świątynia wspaniała i cudna, z której Józafatowianie są dzisiaj dumni. Poświęcenie kościoła odbyło się z wielką uroczystością w 8-go czerwca, 1902 roku. Kościół poświęcił Ks. Biskup Muldoon w zastępstwie Arcybiskupa Feehana, który wtedy był chorym. Kazanie przy tej uroczystości wygłosił Ks. Biskup P. P. Rhode, wówczas będący proboszczem św. Michała w So.

W chicagoskim dzienniku "Record Herald" z tego dnia była umieszczona fotografja kościoła i nastepujacy opis:

ST. JOSAPHAT'S \$125,000 ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH TO BE DEDICATED TO-DAY

"The first Catholic church in the United States to be absolutely fireproof and using the steel skeleton construction is to be thrown open to the public to-day with impressive ceremonies. It is located at Belden and Southport Avenues. The architect was William J. Brinkman, who spent years of study on the details. The interior supports are large angle and plate steel columns sixty-five feet high, which carry the heavy steel trusses that have a clear space of sixty-six feet. The large plaster panels of the coffered ceiling are applied direct to the metallic lath. Another feature of the church is the

stone tracery windows, it being the first in the West with stone mullioned windows, the glass being cemented into the stone. The floor is of Roman ceramic mosaic in beautiful design. Another feature of the church are the three delicately carved doorways and large rose window above the same, hewn out of solid stone and among the most beautiful in the city. Through a vestibule of Italian white marble the auditorium is reached. It seats 1,200 persons. The stations of the cross are in niches in the walls; the confessionals are also in recesses in the masonry, and the radiators are recessed so that the entire floor space is unobstructed. A six foot aisle around the auditorium will be used for processions. At one end of this aisle is the baptistry and at the other an adoration chapel. The gallery will accommodate 300 persons."

Ks. Lange po zbudowaniu kościoła spodziewał się odpoczynku i był przekonanym, że już więcej budynków nie będzie potrzebował stawiać. Tymczasem konieczność inaczej zawyrokowała. Liczba parafjan stale się zwiększała i z czasem zabrakło miejsca dla dzieci w szkole. Trzeba było pomyśleć o nowym budynku szkolnym, gdyż nie można było pomyśleć o zezwoleniu na posyłanie dzieci rodziców katolickich do szkół publicznych. Szkodaby to była straszna wystawiać te dusze, odkupione Przenajdroższą Krwią Zbawiciela, na niebezpieczeństwo zatraty wiary, zmuszonym więc był Ks. Lange zabrać się do budowy nowej szkoły. W tym celu zakupił pięć lot na południowo wschodnim narożniku Belden i Southport Aves. i na trzech z tychże lot stanął w roku 1913 nowy gmach szkolny. Piękny to budynek i wygodny. Mieści w sobie sześć klas i dwie sale dla przedstawień i zabaw.

Ks. Lange patrzał w przyszłość. Zrozumiał on doskonale, że przyszły kapłan będzie musiał zajmować się przedewszystkiem młodzieżą, by ją trzymać przy kościele. Trzeba będzie urządzać różne zabawy, rozrywki, gry, przedstawienia, zapasy, itd., aby młodzież nie szukała rozrywek w miejscach zabronionych. Jak wielkiem błogosławieństwem są te dwie hale najlepiej oceniamy dzisiaj my, których udziałem jest praca nad młodzieżą józafatowską.

Ks. Lange nie cieszył sie długo tym nowym budynkiem, bo następnego roku, dnia 23-go lipca, 1914, około 9-ej wieczorem rozbujałe dzwony kościoła głosiły parafjanom, że ich zacny i gorliwy proboszcz, ich długoletni pasterz, nagle rozstał się z tym światem w szpitalu Braci Aleksjanów.

Oprócz powyżej wymienionych księży wikarych, asystentami Ks. Langiego byli następujący kapła-

KS. JAN LANGE, PH. D., obecny proboszcz parafji św. Michała w South Chicago.

KS. JóZEF KRUSZKA, teraźniejszy proboszcz parafji św. Anny.

KS. JULIUSZ GRZEZIŃSKI, obecny proboszcz parafji Matki Boskiej Różańcowej w North Chicago, Illinois.

KS. FELIKS KACHNOWSKI, dzisiejszy proboszcz parafji św. Stanisława B. M. w Posen, Ill.

Obecny zawiadowca, Ks. Prałat Franciszek G. Ostrowski, był naznaczonym na proboszcza parafji św. Józafata 3-go września, 1914 roku, i objął ja w posiadanie 10-go września tegoż roku. Praca jego od samego początku nie napotkała na wielkie trudności, ponieważ poprzednik jego zaprowadził wspaniały porządek, i jemu nie pozostawało nic innego jak tylko dalej postępować w ślady swego zacnego, gorliwego i popularnego poprzednika.

Najgłówniejsze dzieło za czasów obecnego proboszcza było wybudowanie nowej plebanji. Stara plebanja okazała się za małą na czterech księży i też nie było miejsca dogodnego dla służby, która musiała mieszkać w wilgotnym "basemeńcie," przeto proboszcz poprosił Ks. Arcybiskupa Mundeleina o pozwolenie zbudowania nowej plebanji i to pozwolenie bez trudności otrzymał od naszego Arcypasterza.

Za jego urzędowania umieszczono w starej szkole cztery "bowling alley" czyli kregielnie. Otwarty został klub dla chłopców i dziewcząt kończących naszą szkołę. W nowym gmachu szkolnym przemieniono główną halę na "gym," by mieć obszerne miejsce dla gier piłki koszykowej, "basketball."

Za czasów obecnego proboszcza z towarzystw powstały następujące: Bractwo Dzieci Marji, Tow. Imienia Jezus, Tow. Ołtarza, Trzeci Zakon św. Franciszka, Liga Eucharystyczna, Tow. św. Klary, L. C. B. A., kilka klubów dramatycznych, harcerstwo związkowe, skauting połączony z C. Y. O., Tow. św. Wincentego a Paulo, Stowarzyszenie Właścicieli Domów. Tow. Wiara i Ojczyzna, należące do Związku Polskiego, otrzymało pozwolenie prowadzenia posiedzeń swoich na gruntach parafjalnych, gdyż przedtem miewało zebrania swoje w salach w okolicy.

Wogóle żeśmy starali się pracować dla Boga i dla dobra dusz nieśmiertelnych, dlatego Pan Bóg błogosławił naszym zamiarom i praca dotychczas wydała świetne owoce. Parafjanie zawsze okazywali szczery szacunek dla proboszcza i jego wikarych i przez te prawie dwadzieścia lat naszego urzędowania przyznać musimy, iż żadnych poważnych przykrości nie doświadczaliśmy ze strony parafjan, za co jesteśmy im dzisiaj bardzo wdzieczni. Parafjanie chętnie popierali wszelkie sprawy godne poparcia; ofiarni byli bez usilnego nawoły-

wania ich do ofiarności; chętnie i hojnie dawali | bożej, Franciszki Siedliskiej, napisanej przez J. E. na misje, na ubogich, na Ojca św., na Ziemię św., i na inne dobroczynne cele tak, że parafja może się prawdziwie chlubić z tego, co się dało wykonać przez te ostatnie lat dwadzieścia. To wszystko rokuje dobrze na przyszłość i są wszelkie dane, że zgoda i szacunek i jedność dalej panować będą na Józafatowie, przez co chwała Boża dalej się szerzyć będzie a i dusze z tego będą miały korzyść ogromna.

KS. EDWARD DANKOWSKI, proboszcz parafji św. Simeona w Bellwood, Illinois.

KS. FRANCISZEK DAMPTS, wikary na Młodziankowie.

SZKOŁA.

Założyciele parafji doskonale zrozumieli, że aby zabezpieczyć przyszłość parafji i zachować dziatwe przy ideałach narodowych i kościelnych, potrzebna jest szkoła parafjalna. Dlatego od samego początku istnienia parafji postarano się o Siostry nauczycielki, któreby należycie kształciły dziatwę tutejsza.

Siostry zakonne zjawiły się tutaj w roku 1884. Były cztery: dwie Niemki, jedna Amerykanka i jedna Polka. Lecz pierwsze te Siostry nie pozostały długo, bo tylko jeden rok, gdyż Ks. Barzyński uważał, że najlepiej nadałyby się na te parafje nauczycielki czysto polskie, przeto w roku 1885 sprowadził tutaj Siostry z Najświętszej Familji z Nazaretu, które niedawno przedtem zostały założone przez świątobliwą sługę bożą, Franciszkę Siedliska. Opis ich przybycia na Józafatowo znajdujemy w książce opisującej żywot świątobliwej sługi

Ks. Wincentego Sardi, Arcybiskupa Tytularnego Cezareji. Otóż wyciąg z tego dzieła:

> "Okropne losy nieszczęśliwej Polski, gnębionej przez ościenne państwa, dzielące ją bezprawnie między sobą, miały ten opłakany skutek, że większa część jej mieszkańców rozproszyła się po świecie. Zamożni wyjechali do stolic Europy; ubożsi, zmuszeni do szukania z trudem chleba powszedniego, wyemigrowali do odległej Ameryki. Małe ich kolonje skupiały się wokoło kościołów, gdzie księża tejże narodowości byli ich nauczycielami i ojcami; a takoż starając się o dobrobyt materjalny emigrantów, głównie usiłowali zachować wszczepioną głęboko w ich serce religje i pobożność, przyniesioną z Ojczyzny, którą opuszczali ze łzami. Rzuceni wśród ludności, często nieprzyjaznej katolicyzmowi i oddanej wyłącznie sprawom ziemskim, zagrożeni byli niebezpieczeństwem zapomnienia i porzucenia religji, wykwitłej niejako wespół z ukochaniem ziemi ojczystej. Przy zachowaniu i ocaleniu tej goracej wiary ojców pracowali bardzo gorliwie polscy misjonarze Zmartwychwstańcy. Ale mimo wysiłków z ich strony, jak to łatwo zrozumieć, nie mogli wystarczyć i podołać wszystkiemu. Pożądany był współudział zakonnic przyczyniających się poświeceniem codziennem do dopełnienia mi-

Ojciec Wincenty Barzyński pierwszy upomniał się o taką pomoc dla swej licznej parafji św. Stanisława Kostki w Chicago. Pisał o tem z wielkim naciskiem kilkakrotnie do Oica Lecherta, swego współtowarzysza, spowiednika Franciszki, prosząc o przysłanie kilka sióstr do prowadzenia szkoły i opieki nad przytułkiem sierot.

Roztropna założycielka jednak niełatwo się zapalała i zwykle nic nie postanawiała, dopóki nie zrozumiała, czy w tem jest wola Boża. Poleciła Ojcu Barzyńskiemu, że musi sie nad tem zastanowić.

Tak błagając Boga założycielka nie zapomniała, że można się poradzić wyższej władzy kościelnej. Franciszka przedstawiła propozycje, jakie jej czyniono, swe trudności i watpliwości Kardynałowi Wikarjuszowi Parocchi, następnie Kardynałowi Prefektowi Kongregacji Propagandy, wreszcie chciała także usłyszeć cenną radę Kardynała Ledochowskiego. Wszyscy trzej zupełnie pochwalili ten zamiar i zachecili ją do poświęcenia się dziełu tak zbawiennemu, oraz do predszego wysłania sióstr za ocean.

Pełna zapewnienia i ufności w Bogu, że jestto wola Jego święta, aby jej siostry pra-

cowały w Ameryce. Natychmiast wybiera i przygotowuje misjonarki, i postanowiła sama odwieść tę małą gromadkę złożoną z jedenastu sióstr. Zależało jej na tem, aby mogła sama je umieścić, wszystko zobaczyć i urzadzić.

W połowie czerwca założycielka i siostry udały sie do Ojca św. o błogosławieństwo na podróż. Ojciec święty, Leon XIII, przyjął siostry 13-go czerwca, wyszedł naprzeciw i był dla nich jak ojciec względem dzieci. Pełen dobroci udzielił im apostolskiego b'ogosławieństwa i wyraził życzenie, aby zawsze pracowały pod natchnieniem Ducha św.

Wreszcie nadeszła chwila 17-go czerwca, 1885. Matka Franciszka Siedliska w towarzystwie swych zakonnic opuściła Rzym.

Dnia 4-go lipca siostry dopłynęły do Nowego Jorku. Na dworcu w Chicago czekali na nie Ojciec Barzyński, przełożony misji polskiej i Ks. Radziejewski. Ci towarzyszyli siostrom do przeznaczonego miejsca na Belden Avenue, do kościoła i szkoły św. Józafata. "Najpierw weszłyśmy do kościoła znajdującego się na drugiem piętrze domu parafjalnego; była to poprostu wielka izba, w której postawiono trzy ołtarze drewniane i kilka ławek; bieda najzupełniejsza. Tabernakulum z prostego drzewa, mała lampka wskazywała, że tam mieszka Pan Jezus."

Później poznały się z Ojcem Brei kopfem, miejscowym proboszczem.

Niewiasty polskie przyszły się z niemi poznać, przyniosły z sobą trochę wiktuałów: chleb, masło, ser itp. Biedaczki płakały z radości, widząc je i nazywały je dobremi siostrami z ich dawnej ojczyzny. Dom był prawie pusty, bez łóżek i stołów; zastały tu siostry dziesięć sierót; najstarszy chłopczyk 10-letni chory, ledwie pełzał po ziemi, najstarsza dziewczynka była zaledwie rok stara. Zaraz Matka Siedliska pomyślała o opiece dla tych biednych dzieci, oddając ten mały przytułek jednej z sióstr. W następnych dniach urządzały wszystko w domu i poznaty się z dziećmi i parafją. Matka Siedliska swoja dobrocia anielską przyciągała je wszystkie do siebie. Codzień kobiety, chłopcy, dziewczęta przychodziły a Matka Siedliska każdego obdarzała medalikiem, obrazkiem albo różańcem, dodając do nich przestrogi świete, budujące.

I zaraz Pan Bóg chciał doświadczyć Matkę Założycielkę, bo w pierwszym miesiącu umarła jedna z sióstr, które przyjechały.

We wrześniu, po odbyciu rekolekcji, w których Matka Założycielka starała się przygotować swe siostry do czekającej ich pracy, zaraz dziewiątego września rozpoczęły siostry naukę w szkole parafjalnej św.

Józafata, powierzonej im prócz przytułku dla sierót. Na razie było ze dwieście dzieci, chłopców i dziewcząt.

Pierwszą przełożoną szkoły św. Józafata była Siostra M. Laureta, obecna Matka Generalna Sióstr Nazaretanek."

Czcigodne Siostry Nazaretanki od dnia objęcia

kierownictwa nad naszą szkołą wytrwały dzielnie na swojem stanowisku aż do dnia dzisiejszego; a da Bóg, pozostaną długie jeszcze lata na Józafatowie, spełniając gorliwie i z poświęceniem swe wzniosłe posłannictwo formowanie młodych duszyczek dla Boga, dla rozkoszy wiekuistych.

OWARZYSTWA kościelne są nietylko ozdobą parafji, ale są także bardzo użyteczne dla Kościoła. Każdy proboszcz się cieszy, gdy parafja jego ma liczne kościelne towarzystwa, a zwłaszcza gdy towarzystwa te są czynne i ruchliwe, bo wtedy są one niejako prawą ręką proboszcza, gdyż popierają go w każdej sprawie obchodzącej parafję.

Pozatem towarzystwa takie zachowują w członkach ducha religijnego, bo zachęcają do obowiązków chrześcijańskich i przypominają członkom, gdy mają się stawić do wspólnej spowiedzi i Komunji św. Więc jasnem, że proboszcz cieszy się, gdy w parafji jego powstawają takie towarzystwa, i gdy jest naznaczonym do parafji, gdzie jest mnóstwo takich zrzeszeń, to serce jego jest rozradowane, bo wie, że będzie miał od nich stałe poparcie.

Gdy przybyłem na Józafatowo, zastałem tutaj dużo towarzystw i miło mi było, że wszystkie były związkami czysto katolickiemi i to otuchę wlało w serce moje, bo wiedziałem, że tutaj będzie mi łatwo pracować z tym ludem, bo gdzie Boga stawiają na pierwszem miejscu a inne hasła na drugiem, tam proboszcz nie ma nadmiernego klopotu, tam sprawy zwykle ida według ducha Bożego.

I otóż dzisiaj jedno z tych towarzystw obchodzi złoty jubileusz swego istnienia. Jest to pierwsze z kościelnych towarzystw założone przy początkach parafji. Założyciele Tow. Opieki Matki Boskiej mieli na myśli zrzeszenie, któreby głównie interesowało się sprawami kościelnemi i któreby było podporą proboszcza we wszystkich sprawach obchodzących parafję. I takiem też bezwątpienia było i takiem jest do dnia dzisiejszego, do dnia swego złotego jubileuszu.

Prócz tego założyciele tegoż towarzystwa mieli także materjalne cele na względzie, cele, które opierały się na przykazaniu miłości Boga i bliżniego. Chcieli bowiem pomagać członkom swoim w chorobie a potem rodzinom ich w wypadku śmierci. Pośmiertne było stosunkowo wysokie i z biegiem lat mnóstwo familij odczuło błogie skutki wsparcia z tej ich kasy pośmiertnej. W tych 50 latach swego istnienia towarzystwo zebrało blisko 90 tysięcy dolarów i przeszło 85 tysięcy wy-

dało na pośmiertne i na cele ratunkowe i dobroczynne.

Tow. Opieki Matki Boskiej z początku miało wielkie powodzenie i oczywiście z czasem było największem w parafji, bo liczyło 460 członków, a to było w dniach jego największego rozkwitu. Ale tak nie miało zawsze pozostać, albowiem z czasem zorganizowały się w parafji zrzeszenia, które się połączyły z Zjednoczeniem i z Zakonem Katolickich Leśniczych. Organizacje te Zjednoczenia i Foresterów przyciągały do siebie członków wysokiem pośmiertnem i nizkiemi podatkami, podatkami, które były małe w porównaniu z opłatą w Tow. Opieki Matki Boskiej, przeto skutkiem tego towarzystwo to zaczęło tracić członków i z czasem liczba znacznie spadła. Owszem tak już źle było, iż wyglądało na pewną zagładę. Obawiano się, że towarzystwo zupełnie przestanie istnieć. Ale chwała Bogu nie doszło do tego. Członkowie zreorganizowali się, zmienili swoją konstytucję, zmniejszyli podatki, zniżyli pośmiertne tak, że wpłaty miesięczne już nie są takim ciężarem, i dzieki obrotności i roztropności członków, a głównie zarządu, udało im się zachować towarzystwo przy życiu i dzisiaj mają tę pociechę obchodzić złoty jubileusz swego istnienia.

Towarzystwo to obecnie liczy 102 członków. Nie wielka to liczba, ale doborowa, bo składająca się z wzorowych jednostek, należących do parafji. Członkowie ci są bardzo przywiązani do swego towarzystwa i dzielnie dla niego pracują. I tak być powinno, i to dobrze wróży na przyszłość, to daje nam otuchę, że towarzystwo to potrwa jeszcze długie lata i doczeka się dalszych jubileuszów.

Korzystając z dzisiejszej uroczystości, wyrażam członkom Tow. Opieki Matki Boskiej moje najserdeczniejsze dzięki za to, co przez te lat 50 uczynili dla parafji, i zarazem wynurzam im moje najszczersze życzenia na przyszłość, mianowicie z głębi serca życzę im wszelkiego powodzenia, by towarzystwo ich istniało jeszcze długie lata, by jak najdłużej spełniało swoje szlachetne posłannictwo, by ich praca zawsze była korzystną dla parafji, by z tem rosła chwała Boża a i dusze wynosiły korzyści wiekuiste. Amen.

W kościele odnawia się życie Chrystusa.

(Przez Jednego z Misjonarzy OO. Franciszkanów, O. M. C., Udzielających Misję Jubileuszową.)

▼ EŻELI się zapytam, gdzie jest Bóg, usłyszę odpowiedź: Bóg jest wszędzie, w niebie, na ziemi i w każdem miejscu. Dlatego też mówi św. Paweł: W Nim żyjemy, poruszamy się, w Nim jesteśmy. Wobec tego można Boga wszędzie czcić, można wszędzie modlić się do Niego.

Job wołał z śmietniska, Jonasz z wnętrzności wieloryba, Daniel z lwiej jamy. Wszystkich Bóg słyszał i wysłuchał.

Mimo to obrał Sobie ten wszechobecny Bóg pewne miejsca, w których w szczególniejszy sposób chce być czczony.

Gdy Bóg wybrał sobie naród izraelski i wyprowadził go z niewoli egipskiej, kazał mu wznieść rodzaj świątyni, mianowicie namiot i Sam dał przepisy co do jego urządzenia, ceremonji, naczyń i ofiar. Na czem polegała świętość namiotu? Była nia arka przymierza, którą kazał Bóg sporządzić na znak Swojej szczególnej łaskawości i na znak, że jest ich Bogiem, a oni ludem Jego. Na rozkaz Boży została ona zrobiona z kosztownego drzewa, powleczona złotem, nad nią dwaj aniołowie z rozpostartemi skrzydłami. W jej wnętrzu znajdowała się różdżka Aaronowa, która swojego czasu zakwitła cudownie; manna, którą otrzymali Izraelici na puszczy i dwie tablice, na których dał Pan Bóg Mojżeszowi Swoje przykazania. Dla tych przedmiotów chciał Bóg i żądał, aby to miejsce było uważane za święte i aby otaczano je największą czcią i uszanowaniem.

To były tylko figury i wyobrażenie tego, co my mamy i czcimy w naszych świątyniach. Tam była tylko różdzka Aaronowa, arcykapłana żydowskiego, tu jest sam Arcykapłan Nowego Zakonu, sam Bóg. Tam była manna, tu jest sam Dawca manny. Tam były tablice przykazań, tu sam Prawodawca. Czy wobec tego nie słusznie śpiewamy: Cóż ma niebo nad ziemiany? Jeżeli Mojżesz powiedział o namiocie: Niemasz narodu, któryby miał bogów tak blisko siebie, jak Bóg nasz jest bliski nam; co dopiero mamy powiedzieć o naszym kościele, wobec którego namiot był tylko cieniem?!

Tutaj żyje Jezus, tutaj odnawiają się wszystkie tajemnice całego życia Jego, Jego narodzenie, Jego życie utajone i publiczne. Jego meka i śmierć.

Wielu odbywa dalekie podróże, aby odwiedzić śmiertelne szczątki świętych Pańskich. Z zdumieniem słuchają o ich czynach i z pobożnościa całują ich relikwje. Wielu odbywa pielgrzymkę do ziemi św. aby własnemi oczyma oglądać te miejsca, gdzie nasz Zbawiciel żył i dokonał dzieła odkupienia. O jakież uczucia ogarniają każdego, gdy znajdzie sie w Betlejem, Nazarecie, Jeruzalem!

Tutaj w kościele mamy więcej, aniżeli tam możemy widzieć, tu mamy nietylko pamiątkowe miejsca, ale tu powtarza się to samo, co tam się działo.

W naszych świątyniach ponawia się narodzenie Chrystusa Pana. Codziennie zstępuje wśród ciszy na nasze ołtarze i pozostaje pod białą postacią chleba, jak niegdyś leżał w żłóbku owinięty w pieluszki. A wieczna lampa czy nie spełnia roli gwiazdy, która nas woła do ołtarza, jak wołała mędrców do żłóbka?

Jak niegdyś w Nazarecie był Jezus poddany, posłuszny swoim stworzeniom, spełniał we wszystkiem ich wolę, tak samo pozwala i tutaj robić ze sobą, co się komu podoba.

Tutai odnawia sie życie publiczne Chrystusa. Ten okres zawiera Pismo św. w krótkich słowach: Przeszedł, czyniąc dobrze. To samo czyni i tutaj.

Tutaj widzimy Zbawiciela jako siewcę niebieskiego, który w każdą niedzielę i święto rzuca ziarna swej prawdy w serca wiernych. Nie przemawia On wprawdzie osobiście, ale wiemy, że przez usta kapłanów przemawia On sam. Czem bowiem są kaznodzieje? Czy nie są oni według wyrażenia św. Pawła posłańcami, przez których przemawia sam Bóg? To stwierdza wyraźnie Zbawiciel, mówiąc: Jak mię posłał Ojciec, tak i ja was posyłam. Kto was słucha, ten mię słucha. Tutaj słyszymy poważne prawdy Chrystusowe, które przeszywają duszę, ale też słowa pociechy, które działaja na nia kojaco.

Tutaj spełnia Zbawiciel również swoje czyny miłosierdzia. Najbardziej wzruszające w życiu publicznem Chrystusa jest Jego pełne dobroci i miłosierdzia obchodzenie się z grzesznikami. Spojrzyjcie na konfesjonał. Jestto miejsce milczenia. Ale gdyby mógł mówić, o jak przejmujące rzeczy opowiedziałby nam o grzechu i o nieskończonem miłosierdziu Bożem. O z jaką wdzięcznością powinieneś spoglądać na konfesjonał, gdzie tyle razy obmyła cię Krew Chrystusowa, gdzie rzucono ci ostatnia deske ratunku przed niechybną zagładą. Czy przypominasz sobie ten grzech ciężki, który nie dawał ci spokoju i zatruwał ci życie, a skoroś usłyszał słowa: Ja cię rozgrzeszam od grzechów twoich, uciszyło się znowu sumienie, uspokoiło serce i duszę.

"Pójdźcie do mnie wszyscy, którzy jesteście spracowani i obciążeni, a ja was ochłodz," tak wołał Zbawiciel za życia swojego ziemskiego. Tak woła i dzisiaj z tabernakulum i dotrzymuje swojej obietnicy. Co się działo w wieczerniku, dzieje się tutai podczas każdei Mszy św. Chrystus Pan umarł na krzyżu, każdy ołtarz jest Golgotą. Niech więc głos dzwonu bedzie dla nas radosnym dźwiekiem, wołającym nas na niepojęte tajemnice Boże. Kościół jest źródłem, z którego tryskają strumienia łaski Bożej; jest spichlerzem, pełnym wybornego pokarmu duchowego. Korzystajmy z nich dla szczęścia naszego doczesnego i wiecznego. R. H.

DZISIEJSZYCH czasach często czytamy a częściej słyszymy głoszenie obawy że ten kraj nasz dalej i dalej odsuwa się od Boga i przykazań Jego, powoli zatruwa się własną zgnilizną zepsucia moralnego i społecznego. Udowadniają to zepsucie cyframi statystycznemi—ile ażeby dać żywot drugiemu, nie cofa się. Jej oczy

ludzi nie wierzy w Boga, ile ludzi nie chodzi do kościoła,—ilu nie należy do żadnego wyznania religijnego. Mnożą oni pytania, mnoża swoje badania i śledztwa a zarazem mnoża i cyfry owego wielkiego zepsucia.

Prawda, że istnieje zepsucie-prawda, że wielu nie zajmuje się Bogiemprawda, że wielu używa świata, nie troszcząc się o przyszłą odpowiedzialność przed Stwórcą swoim. Ale czy w historji świata znajdziemy jeden choć wiek w któremby było inaczej?

Obdarzył Pan Bóg człowieka rozumem i wolną wolą, przez Syna Swego wskazał mu drogę zbawienia, ale go nie zmusza do kroczenia tą droga. Człowiek sam, dobrowolną pracą i pomocą Boża musi wyrobić sobie zbawienie duszy-ale go do tego nie zmuszi nawet sam Bog.

Jeśli są ludzie źli w kraju naszym, to są też i ludzie dobrzy. Jeśli są grzesznicy, to znajdą się i świeci. Kraj nasz nie

jest nawskroś trądem zepsucia nasiąknięty—płynie jeszcze w żyłach jego krew czerstwa, bije jeszcze w nim serce szczere i przychylne, kieruje nim jeszcze sumienie tkliwe i wrażliwe, umiejące nietylko ocenić ale zarazem uszlachetnić i uświęcić dzieła ludzi zasłużonych.

Do tych ludzi zasłużonych należą matki naszea dzieło ich, to ta miłość macierzyńska napełniająca każdy zakatek kraju naszego-ta miłość rodząca, opiekująca, krzepiąca każdego z nas. A kraj który potrafi uświęcić tę miłość macierzyńską nie może być nawskroś zepsutym, nie może być zbyt

daleko od Boga oddalonym—ponieważ ta miłość to łańcuch łączący nas wszystkich z samym Bogiem. Ta miłość to dar samego Boga wpojony w serca matek rodzaju ludzkiego.

Chociaż ona wie że musi narazić własne życie

miłością lśniące przedstawiają sobie w przyszłości to szczęście, tę chwałę, a może i tę potege której dziecko jej się doczeka. Pierwszy płacz dziecka to dla niej śpiew anielski-drżącemi rękoma pieści go, a dusza jej trwożliwa szepce modlitwe ażeby to dziecko żyło. Powoli do zdrowia i sił wraca, tuli to dziecko do serca i karmi, ale też czasem sama zgłodniała i umierająca ostatek swej siły piersią dziecku daje ażeby ono żywot miało.

Największą troskliwościa otacza to dziecię. Chociaż nieraz oczy strudzeniem i snem zamknięte to jednak dusza jej czuwa i na pierwszy ruch dziecka mimowolnie pieści go do snu. Z dumą pilnuje to wzrastające dziecie, chroni od złego, wszczepia uczucia honoru i wiary w odwiecznego Boga. A gdy głowa jej bieleje a wiek podeszły siły odbiera, ta miłość nie ustaje ale staje się głębszą i słodszą. Chociażby ona doczekała się

starości własnych dzieci—to oczy jej nie widzą tego wieku, ale tylko młodość dziecinną a uszy słyszą tylko głos małego dziecka.

Ta miłość prowadzi tę matkę nawet do więzienia ażeby tam ucałowała morderczą rękę dziecka. Znajdziemy ją obok dziecka w sądzie, a gdy się wydaje że świat cały drwi z losu jego, ta matka go pociesza i pokrzepia. Skazane na śmierć—ona przy nim a ciało martwe całusami i kwiatami obsypuje ponieważ dla niej to tylko dziecko niewinne, które ona tuliła do piersi swojej.

Lecz jeśli drogi życia prowadzą to dziecko do

chwały wielkiej, serce jej pała radością i dumą niewymowną. Jeśli powołany na wojnę ona go żegna sercem bolejącem i płaczącem ale postawą i miną zewnętrzną dodaje mu otuchy ażeby mężnie za kraj walczył. On gdzieś daleko w namiocie albo w szpitalu spoczywa, ona nocami na modlitwie czuwa, prosząc Boga o jego powrót. A gdy może wraca w trumnie wtenczas i ona serce swoje przy nim kładzie—dla niej niema już pociechy—nie ma nawet checi życia.

Taka to miłość matki—a rząd nasz wspaniałomyślnie postąpił gdy wyznaczył jedną niedzielę maja jako dzień specjalnie tym matkom poświęcony. Oznacza to że kraj nasz odczuwa i ocenia te zasługi matek, a nam daje zapewnienie że przez tę pamieć zasług matek kraju naszego dzieci trafia do Boga.

My zaś katolicy powinniśmy w sposób szczególniejszy dać dowód oceny tej miłości. Nietylko dać wyraz jej przez upominek materjalny ale przez duchowny. A wiec módlmy się za matkę naszą, ofiarujmy za nia Msze św. o uproszenie dla niej zdrowia, albo o spokój jej duszy jeżeli już nas pożegnała. Za życia nie trapmy jej, nie sprawiajmy jej smutku, nie rańmy serca niewdzięcznością. Zanośmy modlitwy do Matki matek w niebie aby ona rece osłabione, trzesące się i pracą sponiewierane podtrzymywała, a kroki teraz niepewne kierowała do nieba, aby tam przy jej boku w szczęściu i radości spoczywała, i nam wyjednała tam miejsce.







The Legion of Decency

Keep away from indecent movies and Hollywood will soon learn a little Christian decency.

ATHOLIC ACTION," not a meaningless phrase but a definite program, is being put to its first real test in this country. The test is the Crusade against Hollywood for Clean Motion Pictures. The battle we have reason to believe is being won. Four of the seven Hollywood "lots," Fox, Universal, Columbia, and RKO-Radio, have capitulated and are willing to "go along." The other three, Paramount, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, and Warner Brothers are still "standing pat." One "movie" magnate took a defiant stand when he heard of the plea of the bishops for clean pictures. As far as he was concerned, he announced, he took no standards from any Catholic bishops, and did what he liked no matter what they thought. Brave words, spoken manfully, but the "movie" magnate, it is thought, was a bit indiscreet.

The Bishops have acted, but with better discretion. The Legion of Decency was formed, jumped to a nation-wide organization in a few weeks, and may induce the "movie" magnate to "regret" his

"indiscreet utterance." The plan is simple. The "rights" of no one are violated. To become a member of the Legion of Decency you simply take a pledge to "stay away" from objectionable movies. It is not even necessary to take the pledge. Simply "staying away" will make you as good a member as one who takes the pledge if you object to "red tape." As the difference between success and failure of any objectionable picture is approximately \$35,000 to \$50,000, it will be only a short time before you will get "what you want" even from an indiscreet "movie" magnate.

The Legion of Decency will have tremendous support from Catholic and non-Catholic organizations. In a letter to Rt. Rev. Michael Sullivan, editor of the Central California Register on April 25, Bishop James Chamberlain Baker, of the Methodist-Episcopal Church, "consisting of 742 congregations in California, Arizona, Nevada, and the Hawaiian Islands" tendered his support "in the campaign for decency in the films." The disinterested offer of Bishop Baker is highly commendable and typical of the support that every thoughtful citizen will give no matter to what creed he belongs. "I am happy," writes Bishop Baker, "to think that Catholics and Protestants can stand side by side in protest against indecent films."

Father Lord, S. J., National Sodality Director and editor of the Queen's Work, in a vigorous, well-informed editorial has enlisted the sodalists of the country in the fight and has formally served "notice upon all the producing companies that this campaign has begun, and that it will continue until we see these companies abiding by the Code of Morals which they solemnly agreed to follow and which they have flagrantly violated." The half million sodalists of the country can assist in no better way than by joining the campaign under the auspices of the Sodality of Our Lady and under the leadership of their capable National Director.

There are some who believe that Catholics are being urged to stay away from the movies altogether. That is not true. The Catholic attitude on the moving picture crusade is well expressed by Bishop Thomas J. Toolen of Mobile, Alabama. "Encourage the good, condemn the evil. . . Pledge yourselves to stay away from evil movies, not to read evil books, magazines or papers. If we hit the pocketbooks of the producer, he will soon begin to give us pictures that we will all be glad to see. If we do not buy evil books, and magazines, they will soon disappear from the news-stands."

WANTED: 10,000 Such Girls

TF this call were for a good position, how they would hasten to outdo the other. But a good job, even today, has not in it what we are urging all Catholic girls to enter the contest for at once—a noble character. More important than any worldly beauty or popularity contest is this plea for beautiful souls. — It has been a long time since such an honest, open-letter and heart-toheart talk came to notice, and that, mind you, from a woman who is interested in the uplift and protection of the modern girl and has saved many a one by her wise counsels. We shall give it as it is, adding only the earnest request that every father and mother who reads this article cut it out to pass it on to every son and daughter, and that every Catholic girl, who wants to be clean, decent and pure, hand it over to her boy friends and steady company. It will do more good than ten sermons.

"Has the day passed when a girl is expected to be virtuous? It seems to me that it has. I never go out with a boy that expects me to do things that no decent girl would do, and I don't intend to drag myself down into the GUTTER for any man's selfish desires. I am not happy because every time I find a boy I like real well, I am put aside as soon as he finds out that I am STRAIGHT, and he gets the girl who is not so particular. I have been tempted many times to give in because I hated to lose the boy. The thought of God and of a dear mother saved me. I have lost boy friends just because I wanted to hold on to the standard that women are supposed to possess. Please answer this letter, not for my sake, but for many other girls who have talked to me and who are tempted as I am by such human curs."

spect for a woman's virtue and no respect for a girl's innocence?

Do you really think that sort of a man is WORTH having? Do you think he would make a FAITHFUL AND TRUE HUSBAND? Don't you think a girl sells out for a pitiably small price who bargains her purity for a few movie tickets, a few dinners and dances? You can buy your own ice cream sodas and pay for your own car fare and still have the pleasure of your own self respect and good name—can't you, Girls? Be honest.

Believe me, my dears, there is no other more contemptible figure than the caddish modern youth who tries to make a girl pay for his attentions with her honor; and why any girl falls for such an unequal bargain passes all comprehension. Such a boy or girl doesn't pretend to be in love with her. He doesn't seriously offer to marry her honorably. He merely buys her a ham sandwich and takes her to a ten-cent dance hall and the neighborhood movie, and for that and the joy of looking at him, THE CONTEMPTIBLE CUR THAT HE IS, he expects her to give up her purity, her honor, her soul.

willing to marry a woman with a sullied past and who has been the filthy plaything to other men's lowly passions. And when one does try to forgive, he never forgets and never trusts her fully again.

The HAPPY MARRIAGES are where the man has faith in his wife's GOODNESS AND VIRTUE as he has faith in God, and when she has no bitter regrets in her heart and hides no shameful secrets from Him.

THE VALUE OF CATHOLIC EDUCATION

"To prepare us for complete living is the function which Education has to discharge." HERBERT SPENCER.

W HICH are the superior, the Catholic or the Public Schools, is a question often put up for an answer. Many educators have gathered often-times to discuss the subject, pamphlets have been written on that topic and the question seemed settled, but alas, disputes still arise as to the superiority of each in certain principles.

However, considering disciplines of the will, development of character, and religious training, which are vital interests in the minds of every Catholic parent, it is soon apparent that in these matters the Catholic schools surpass the public ones.

Discipline of the will! A vital principle of each and every man's life! And how to be obtained? Through a Catholic education. Is not little Mary, aged six, on entering the 1st grade, impressed in an abstract way with this first step in her training? The nun has her play "Ring-Around-Rosy" with a group of girls rather than permit her to do as she pleases.

Character-development is another essential taught in the Catholic schools. It is a necessity for anyone who would make a success in life. History furnished us with examples of a Napoleon and an Alexander who succeeded for a time, but eventually failed because they lacked that foundation of all success—a strong character. The acquisition of it depends upon discipline of the will. Many restrictions are placed upon the pupil and as she advances further restraints are imposed, according to her capability of coping with them, to check the exercise of her will, and to guide her in the proper method of action.

A religious elementary training is in most cases obtained by Catholics because of their parochial schools. But a Catholic High School is not so often frequented by the present generation. It is true public high schools may be capable of instructing and imparting Algebra, Latin, and so forth, but the fundamental lessons are lacking: Christian Doctrine and Practice.

Men, as well as women, who in the last half century have attained recognition for themselves in medicine, law, commerce and other professions, who wish to render their undivided service and zeal to their occupations are in need of a course in ethics under Catholic supervision. And what college is not prepared to meet this demand!

Taking into consideration the teaching body of both systems we may soon find the superiority of the former. Teachers of the public schools are no doubt capable instructors and disciplinarians, but are they able to devote as much of their time to the classroom interest and individual needs as the religious who has not as much connection with the outside world?

Summarizing, what then is the ultimate value of a Catholic education? Moral, intellectual and physical benefit is derived and a full understanding and comprehension of the true meaning of the eternal questions: Whence am I? Why am I? and Whither am I bound? is taught and impressed on the minds and hearts of the mass. Thus EDUCATION fulfills its chief function by preparing us for complete living.

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
